

BERRIES

All listed varieties are self-fruitful

BLACKBERRY – BLACK SATIN

Prolific producer of tasty large, black fruit in midsummer of the second year. Small white flowers precede fruit on erect, then arching to the ground thornless canes. Heat tolerant.

BLACKBERRY - OLALLIE

Low chill. Large, shiny black, sweet "wild" berry taste.

Vigorous grower, very productive. Commercially grown in California. Ripens late May to early July.

BLUEBERRY - GEORGIA GEM

150-200 chilling hours. Southern Highbush (low chill/tolerates heat) 5-6'. Medium sized fruit with excellent flavor and quality. Ripens Early to midseason.

BLUEBERRY - O'NEAL

200 Hours Southern Highbush (low chill/tolerates heat) 5-6'. Large fruit is especially sweet and flavorful.

Early season. Self-fruitful, but plant two plants for biggest crops. Ripens May-June.

BOYSENBERRY - THORNLESS

Medium reddish-black berry. Delicious sweet and tart

Ripens mid May-June.

RASPBERRY - HERITAGE

Large, very firm. Excellent quality. Moderate early July crop and heavy crop in early September. An everbearing variety with good vigor, hardy canes which do not require staking. #1 fall variety. Ripens early July and Sept.

RASPBERRY – CANBY RED

On second year old canes, small white flowers are followed by tasty dark red berries. Erect, thornless canes eventually arching to the ground.

RASPBERRY – WILLAMETTE

Prolific producer of very large, dark red fruit. This is the principal commercial variety. A large crop is produced in summer on 2 year old canes, the again in fall on the new canes

GRAPES

All listed varieties are self-fruitful

CABERNET SAUVIGNON

Red wine grape, small, black, strongly flavored berry.

CHARDONNAY

For white burgundy wines, small round berry. Best quality where summers are cool.

FLAME

Red skin with firm flesh. Crisp, sweet. Late July.

MERLOT

Black berry, used for distinctive red wines. Best quality where summers are cool.

PERLETTE

Large, pale green, seedless, crisp, juicy. Late July.

THOMPSON SEEDLESS

Pale green to golden, very sweet, likes heat. Early August.
