NAME	HEIGHT	HARDINESS	COMMENTS
<b>PHOENIX RECLINATA Senegal Date Palm</b>	20-30 feet	Hardy to 28 degrees	Forms picturesque trunks.
<b>PHOENIX CANARIENSIS Canary Island Date Palm</b>	to 60 feet and to 50 feet wide	Hardy to 20 degrees	Grow on slopes, in parks, wide streets, and big spaces, not for small lots
<b>WASHINGTONIA ROBUSTA Mexican Fan Palm</b>	to 100 feet	Hardy to 20 degrees	Fast growing. Street or parkway, or groves.
<b>WASHINGTONIA FILIFERA California Fan Palm</b>	to 60 feet	Hardy to 18 degrees	Trunk more robust than W. robusta.
<b>TRACHYCARPUS FORTUNEI Windmill Palm</b>	to 30 feet	Hardy to 10 degrees	Trunk covered with hairy fiber.
<b>CHAMAEROPS HUMILIS Mediterranean Fan Palm</b>	slow to 10 feet or so	Hardy to 6 degrees	Good for containers, mass under trees, impenetrable hedge. Drought and wind resistant. Good near swimming pools.
<b>ARECASTRUM ROMANZOFFIANUM Queen Palm</b>	to 50 feet	Hardy to 16 degrees	Graceful fronds. Use singly or in groups
<b>BRAHEA EDULIS Guadalupe Palm</b>	to 30 feet	Hardy to 20 degrees	Stout trunked.

<b>BUTIA CAPITATA</b> <b>Pindo Palm</b>	<b>Slow to 10-20</b> <b>feet</b>	<b>Hardy to 15</b> <b>degrees</b>	<b>Beautiful gray-</b> <b>green arching</b> <b>leaves. Yellow to</b> <b>red edible fruit.</b>
<b>LIVISTONIA</b> <b>CHINENSIS</b> <b>Chinese Fountain Palm</b>	<b>to 15 feet</b>	<b>Hardy to 22</b> <b>degrees</b>	
<b>ARCHONTOPHOENIX</b> <b>CUNNINGHAMIANA</b> <b>King Palm</b>	<b>to 50 feet</b>	<b>Hardy to 28</b> <b>degrees</b>	<b>Tolerates shade.</b> <b>Can grow</b> <b>grouped under</b> <b>trees.</b>
